Lent 2024 -- A Journey from Re: Choice to Rejoice

Then Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tested by the devil. ² He fasted forty days and forty nights, and afterward he was famished. The tempter came and said to him, "If you are the Son of God, command these stones to become loaves of bread." But he answered, "It is written, 'One does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God.""

Matthew 4:1-4

Lent, the forty day period that begins on Ash Wednesday and concludes on Good Friday, commemorates the time Jesus fasted in the desert prior to beginning his ministry. Hungry and alone, he confronted the temptation of forsaking God in favor of comfort, power, and wealth. *And he chose God each time.*

This year, the Worship and Sacraments Board asks you to consider the choices we all make in our lives. What guides them? Do we ever really "have no choice?" What hopes or fears do our choices imply? What consequences come of them? Have there been choices we wish we'd reconsidered? How do we handle regret? If our lives are our journeys, what happens when we choose one path over another as Robert Frost expressed?

Two roads diverged in a wood, and I—I took the one less traveled by, And that has made all the difference.

As our forty-day Lenten journey takes us along a path from **re: choice to Rejoice** on Easter Sunday, we are asking those who bring the message on Sunday mornings to reflect on a theme captioned by a word that begins with the prefix, "re," such as "reclaim," "restore," "revise," "reinvent." We encourage everyone to ponder how so many of these words move us to modify our choices. With the Holy Spirit guiding us, what will change if we, like Jesus, consciously choose God each time?

The following article appeared in the January 11, 2024 Stillspeaking Daily Devotional distributed by the United Church of Christ (UCC). It carries an interesting message.

YES, YOU DO

Let each of you look not to your own interests but to the interests of others. - Philippians 2:4 (NRSVUE)

If one member [of the Body of Christ] suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together with it. - 1 Corinthians 12:26 (NRSVUE)

"I don't need the microphone. Everyone can hear me. I'm loud enough!" How many times have you heard this? Or maybe you couldn't hear it because...

Yes, you do need the mic. You might not need the mic to speak, but others need it to hear.

Sometimes microphone resistance has an air of bravado, awkwardness, or technophobia. Yet underlying all of that is ableism. When we use our own ability — or our current, temporary lack of disability — to assume the abilities of others, we center ourselves, dismissing and dishonoring others. Nurturing a covenant that honors all members of the Body requires a dialogue instead of a monologue, moving us from "I don't need it, so no one else does" to "I don't need it, but others say they do."

Paul's words to the Philippians offer a counterpoint to and continuation of "Do unto others as you would have them do to you" (Matthew 7:12), inviting us to set aside our assumptions, preferences, and even discomfort so that the needs of many are met. When even one member's needs are dismissed, the whole Body suffers. But when one member's needs are met, the whole Body benefits.

So yes, we do need the mic so others can hear what we're saying. Even more, we need to pass the mic so we can amplify the Body's rejoicing.

Prayer

Move us from self-focused assumptions to other-informed radical inclusion. Amen.


BIBLE LITERACY - A Bible Study Program

ADDRESSING FOOD INSECURITIES

ISLAND HEART FOOD PANTRY IS SERVING MORE PEOPLE THAN EVER

2023 was a busy year at the Island Heart Food Pantry. Many more visitors needed food as is shown in this chart that compares Annual Food Pantry Numbers from 2021, 2022 and 2023:

WE ARE ALWAYS IN NEED OF MORE FOOD, BUT RIGHT NOW WE ARE ASKING THAT YOU CONSIDER BECOMING A **NEW VOLUNTEER** FOR THIS MUCH APPRECIATED MISSION.

WE NEED PEOPLE FOR THE FOLLOWING:

- <u>Food set-up</u> at the pantry on Wednesdays from 11:00 AM to 12:00 PM. Unpack boxes, fill shelves and assemble boxes of food in preparation for distribution later in the day.
- <u>Food distribution</u> on either Wednesday or Thursday from 2:00 to 4:15 PM. Fill boxes, talk with visitors and carry boxes to cars.
- Food Pick-up Volunteers pick up food at Long Island Cares in Hauppauge and bring it to the pantry, usually on Wednesdays. Usually mid-morning, but it is different each week. You will need to have access to a large vehicle/truck.

We thank you for your consideration of these volunteer opportunities.

The Food Cupboard at the Church serves local people in need of food and supplies. Thanks to all for the generous donations in the past. Please put all items in kitchen size garbage bags. The company pays 20 cents per pound up to 10,000 lbs. (100 bags = about 2,000 lbs.) and 25 cents for each pound over 10,000.
